

General Formatting Requirements

- Margins should be set to 1 inch on all sides
- The font should be readable and consistent between 11-13pt in a style, for example Times New Roman or Calibri
- The document should be double-spaced with no extra spacing in between paragraphs
- Page numbers in the headers begin on the first page of text after the title page
- Each paragraph should begin with the first line left-indented 0.5 inches

Formatting the Title Page

- Your title page should include:
 - ⇒ The title of your paper, in bold
 - ⇒ Your name
 - ⇒ Course name
 - ⇒ Due date
- All information on the title page should be double space-spaced and following the same format as the sample paper:

Incorporating Evidence

- When including evidence, you can quote, summarize, or paraphrase your sources
- For short quotations (four or fewer lines of prose), enclose your quote in double quotation marks within your paragraph
- For long quotations (forty or more words), you must use block quotations
 - ⇒ Include the quote in a free-standing block of text with no quotation marks
 - ⇒ Maintain double-spacing, and use a 0.5-inch indentation for the whole quote
- Whether you are directly quoting, summarizing, or paraphrasing, you must include a citation

In-Text Citations

- Citations refer your reader to the sources you used as evidence for your claims
- In-text citations will include a superscripted number aligned with the citation in the footer

During the withdrawal of the intervention, the students regressed back to baseline. However, when the intervention was reintroduced, the students showed significant improvement in their time spent on-task in class.¹ Both the participants and the teachers rated this intervention positively, resulting in social validity and treatment acceptability.² This study supports and extends previous literature by including secondary students in special education. Using technology for these interventions is becoming more common, but much of the previous literature may not display the impact of growing technology.³

Bibliography and In-Text Citations

The Bibliography is at the end of an CMOS-style paper that shows all the sources you used in your essay. It gives full publication details for each source so readers can locate the original material. Every source that appears in the Bibliography must also be cited in the paper using in-text citations, and vice versa.

Bibliography Formatting

- All sources are listed in alphabetical order
- List up to 3 authors in the reference page before “et al.”
- No extra spacing between entries
